This surface can either be a digital or phisical surface.





Once you are finished you must be able to fold your surface, or a representation of it, in a columnal surface with your work on the outside.








Les Deux Plateaux, more commonly known as the Colonnes de Buren, is a highly controversial art installation created by the French artist Daniel Buren in 1985–1986.

As described by the architectural writer Andrew Ayers, "Buren's work takes the form of a conceptual grid imposed on the courtyard, whose intersections are marked by candy-striped black-and-white columns of different heights poking up from the courtyard's floor like sticks of seaside rock. ... In one sense the installation can be read as an exploration of the perception and intellectual projection of space."


"The project was the "brainchild" of the culture minister Jack Lang and elicited considerable controversy at the time. It was attacked for its cost and unsuitability to a historic landmark. Lang paid no attention to the orders of the Commission des Monuments Historiques, which objected to the plan. In retrospect Ayers has remarked: "Given the harmlessness of the result (deliberate — Buren wanted a monument that would not dominate), the fuss seems excessive, although the columns have proved not only expensive to install, but also to maintain."



Les colonnes de Buren are a permanent installation built in 1986 which extends over 3000 m2 in the courtyard of the Royal Palace "Palais Royal" in the 1st district of Paris.

The installation includes 260 black and white striped columns (in all Buren's work the bands have a fixed measure of 8.7 cm). The columns are made of white carrara marble and black marble


from the Pyrenees.





Daniel Buren (born 25 March 1938) is a French conceptual artist. Sometimes classified as a Minimalist, Buren is known best for using regular, contrasting colored stripes in an effort to integrate visual surface and architectural space, notably on historical, landmark architecture.

He graduated from the Ecole Nationale Supérieure des Métiers d'Art in Paris, in 1960.[1] He began painting in the early 1960s. From 1960 on, Buren designed a number of permanent site-specific installations in the United States, Belgium, France, and Germany. In 1986 he created a 3,000-square-meter sculpture in the great courtyard of the Palais Royal, in Paris: Les Deux Plateaux, more commonly referred to as the Colonnes de Buren ("Buren's Columns").[citation needed] This provoked an intense debate over the integration of contemporary art and historic buildings.[citation needed] In 1993, Buren was commissioned to design the work in situ, Poser/Déposer/Exposer, for the Café Richelieu at the Louvre in collaboration with Jean-Pierre Raynaud. In 1986, when François Mitterrand was president of France, Buren attained leading artist status after he created Les Deux Plateaux (1985-86), a work in situ for the Cour d'honneur at the Palais Royal in Paris. That same year, he represented France at the Venice Biennale and won the Golden Lion Award for best pavilion. Buren had major solo exhibitions at the Touko Museum of Contemporary Art, Tokyo, in 1989, at the Centre Georges Pompidou in Paris in 2002,[24] at the Guggenheim Museum in New York in 2005, at Modern Art Oxford in 2006, and at the Kunsthalle Baden-Baden in 2011.



Les Deux Plateaux is located in the inner courtyard (Cour d'Honneur) of the Palais Royal in the 1st Arrondisment of Paris, France.


